

Shifting the Paradigm of Conservation from "as it were" to the Present

Professor Amareswar Galla, PhD, The Australian National University and the University of Queensland

In the evolving paradigm of sustainable heritage development there are two non-negotiables: conservation and community development. When these two non-negotiables are reconciled we begin to shift the paradigm of conservation where heritage—both tangible and intangible cultural diversity, and sustainable development come together into an integrated management model. It means locating culture and environment in sustainable development. In this process there are several choices we make in our work: freezing the 'object' in a synchronic time capsule through conservation as if it 'were' or liberating the 'object' through multiple meanings including responsible and authoritative use providing a diachronic and dynamic context. There are many paths that are taken and some that are not taken in addressing diverse professional challenges and that makes all the difference in our role as facilitators of heritage conservation. This address explores the rethinking of the conservation practice in the field from not an individual lens but from a holistic communitygrounded perspective. It is illustrated through firsthand project work in South Africa, Belize, Vietnam, India, the Netherlands, and Australia during the past three decades.

Preservation goes high-tech for Monroe's famous subway dress

First seen in the 1955 classic movie *The Seven Year Itch* and later immortalized in a countless number of memorabilia items, Marilyn Monroe's famous white "subway" dress has become an icon of American pop culture.

Today, the billowy dress is stored in a vault in the Debbie Reynolds Hollywood Motion Picture Museum, a non-profit museum that currently has the largest collection of Hollywood memorabilia in the world. There, HOBO data loggers are being used to keep tabs on shifts in climate—humidity in particular—that could damage the \$2.2 million dress.

"Excessive humidity can be a severe enemy to antique textiles," explains Todd Fisher, museum CEO and son of Hollywood actress Debbie Reynolds. "While our museum environment is extremely stable, the mentality is that we don't want to take any chances and find out one day that mold has been growing on the dress or something drastic like that. The more safeguards we have the better."


The museum uses HOBO loggers to measure and record humidity levels around-the-clock. "We look at the data on a monthly basis to make sure humidity stayed below 50%," said Fisher. "The data also tells us what the temperature levels were during the period, which we like to keep around 68°F. Our long-term goal is that nothing extreme happens."

He adds, "Classic movies are an extremely important part of American history, and thousands of years from now the only remains from these movies will be the tangible items such as the costumes and props. By taking advantage of new technology like HOBOs, we can better manage our collections so that they will be here for generations to come."
