

2018 Member Designation Survey

Preliminary Report

Tuesday, May 15, 2018

Prepared by the Membership Designation Working Group

The Membership Designation Working Group (MDWG) developed a survey that was sent to all AIC members in January 2018. Over 900 members responded, giving us a tremendous amount of data to analyze; we are still in the midst of this, especially as many of the responses were not easily quantified. We greatly appreciate the time given by members to help us identify priorities and needs for member designation, both personally and throughout the field. We know the information captured in the survey is of great interest to many of our members, so we have made a summary of the survey results available, while bearing in mind the sensitive nature of some of the information.

Open-Ended Questions and Privacy

We would like to share as much information as possible about the results of our Member Designation Survey. However, we are aware that some of the information that was shared by respondents might be personally identifying information and we want to do our best to protect their privacy. As such, we are not sharing individual, open-ended responses. Some questions had open-ended choices as possible answers and some only asked for an open-ended response. We are sharing the data for internal, informational use only. The results are interesting and help us better understand our membership. However, the data should not be considered prescriptive or definitive about either the organization's membership or the field at-large. If you would like to use this data for anything other personal instruction, please contact the MDWG regarding the intended use.

Preliminary Analysis

In reviewing responses, suggestions on how to improve the current peer-reviewed member designation process were grouped into categories. Among the types of responses that showed up most frequently are:

- improving communication (about the review process and meaning of peer-reviewed member designations)
- making changes to the requirements
- making changes to the application process
- pursuing certification
- encouraging sponsors to offer more mentorship throughout the process
- requiring ongoing continuing education
- changing the name(s) of the peer-reviewed designation categories.

The survey also showed that a few myths and misinformation continue to exist, particularly around the idea that members with peer-reviewed designation pay higher dues than Associate members.

Survey Structure

Since the survey was tailored to address a wide variety of backgrounds, not everyone was asked the same set of questions depending upon their answers to previous questions. Below is breakdown of the survey questions and how they related to each other.

Professional Demographics

All respondents were asked Questions 1-3.

Training and Experience Demographics

- If the respondent said that they were becoming a conservator, had ever practiced conservation, or were currently a conservator, they were then asked Questions 4-6.
- If they answered they had primarily received program training, they were asked Questions 7-9.
- If they answered that their primary training was apprenticeship/on-the-job-training, they were asked Questions 10-11.
- If the respondent said they were either not a conservator, not becoming a conservator, or had never practiced conservation, they were asked Question 12.
- Following Question 12, 13-15 asked those respondents for information about the course of study, name of the program/school, and length of the program where the respondent pursued their training.
- Questions 13-15 were open-ended questions and are not included in this data set, but to provide a sense of scope, 52 people responded to Question 13, 49 responded to Question 14, and 48 people responded to Question 15.

Workplace Demographics

All respondents were asked Questions 16-23.

Membership and Designation Demographics

- If the respondent answered that they were an Associate member, they were asked Question 24.
- If they answered they were a Professional Associate, they were asked Questions 25 and 26.
- If they answered that they were a Fellow, they were asked Question 26.
- All respondents were asked Questions 27-33. Questions 31 and 32 were openended questions and are not included in this data set. 245 people responded to Question 31, which asked "What other value, if any, do you associate with peerreviewed membership designation?" Question 32 asked "Please share any suggestions below on how to improve AIC's peer-reviewed membership designations," and 269 people responded.

Next Steps

The MDWG will:

Continue to analyze results from this survey

- Evaluate the current application and review process considering current member priorities and needs (as identified by our working group liaisons from survey results and additional research)
- Develop a follow-up survey that will inform proposed changes to the peer-reviewed membership designation program.


About the Membership Designation Working Group (MDWG)

Chairs: Stephanie Lussier was appointed as chair. In September 2017, Deborah Trupin joined as Co-chair.






Q2 If you selected "Conservation Educator" in the previous question, please indicate what/where do you teach, selecting all that apply.




Q3 If you did not choose conservator in the previous question, are you in the process of becoming a conservator or have you ever practiced conservation?




Q4 Since you said you have practiced conservation, how many years have you been in the field? Please include all years of training and education.




Q5 Where did you primarily train?




Q6 What was your primary form of conservation training?




Q7 Since you indicated program training, please indicate number of preprogram years, including all years spent volunteering or working in a conservation lab:






Q9 Indicate number of years practicing in the profession (post-graduation):




Q10 Since you chose apprenticeship/on-the-job training, please indicate length of such training:










Q22 How many years have you been an AIC member?




Q23 What is your AIC membership type?




Q24 Since you are an Associate member, what are the reasons/concerns that have prevented you from applying to become a Professional Associate (PA)? Please select all that apply.




Q25 As a Professional Associate, what are the reasons/concerns that have prevented you from applying to become a Fellow? Please select all that apply.




Q26 Do you use/list your peer-reviewed membership designation in any of the following places:



Q27 Whether you have obtained one or not, which benefits do you associate with peer-reviewed membership designation (Professional Associate and Fellow) [check all that apply]?




